**THE LOW-DOWN ON THE HIGH GUNS**

Texas. John J. Dury, 32 years old, is affiliated with the San Antonio Gun Club and is a gun and ammunition salesman at the Straus-Frank Company, San Antonio, Texas. His favorite gun is the Parker with Remington ammunition. He also likes Remington guns. The most exciting Skeet event in his career, as may well be imagined, was in 1929 when he tied for the big Southwestern Championship with 96 out of a hundred and won the shoot-off with a score of 24 out of 25. The toughest station on the field for him is the low bird from No. 5.

For unusual records, he has 618 out of 625 with a 12 gauge gun, 24 out of 25 with a 410, and 199 out of 200 with a 12 gauge gun. For long runs he has 85, 96, 114, 128. He is a hunter and a

fisherman and has been shooting Skeet since 1928. His first score was 17 with a 20 gauge gun. Skeet has helped him a great deal in his field shooting. His favorite kind of game is deer.

Massachusetts. Samuel L. Holman is 69 years of age, lives at Attleboro, Mass. He is affiliated with the Angle Tree Stone, Attleboro, Mansfield, Foxboro and Dighton Rod and Gun Clubs. He is occupied as a landlord and insurance agent. A 12 gauge Browning using Remington Shur-Shot Shells receives his bid for favorite gun and ammunition. In reply to the question as to which is the toughest station on the field for him, he replies, "There ain't any."

He has unusual records of 98 out of a hundred and a long run of 79. He enjoys the radio and has been shooting for a year and a half. His first score was five. Skeet shooting has helped his field shooting decidedly. In regard to his opinion on the small bore gun for Skeet, he says, "I have just bought a 410 gauge and enjoy it very much."

New York. Jule Heintz, Jr., of Canastota, N. Y., is 27 years old. He is affiliated with the Utica Gun Club and the Canastota Gun Club, and is occupied in the Civil Service. His favorite gun is a Winchester 12 gauge pump and he uses either Western Expert, United States Defiance or Remington Shur-Shot shells. The most interesting Skeet event in his career was the New York State Shoot held at Bay View Club, Brooklyn, N. Y., June 15, 1930. The toughest stations on the field for him are the outgoing birds from 2 and 6. He says, "I have to be careful with them." His first 25 was made on June 30, 1929. He is an upland hunter and a wild fowler and enjoys shooting woodchucks and crows in the spring and summer months. He has been shooting Skeet for about three years and broke 21 on his first try. Skeet has helped him in his field shooting, especially on grouse where speed is a very important factor. He enjoys hunting all kinds of game. He believes that the 20 gauge is the coming gun for Skeet and feels that it is holding its own with the larger bores.

Jules Heintz is Secretary of the N. Y. State Skeet Ass'n, and very active at the Skeet clubs in and around Utica. He was runner-up in 1930 State shoot at Brooklyn and plans to enter 1931 State event at Utica, May 16th and 17th.
